#### Rewards

Rewards produce a sense of achievement amongst our students, which creates a positive learning environment, increases their motivation and well-being, which then in turn translates into more effective learning. Small achievements boost self-confidence and when a student has growing self-esteem, they begin to have high aspirations and are more willing to aim for higher results and accomplishments.

In collaboration with our Sixth Form Leadership Team, we have introduced certificates for students to work towards to give them motivation. Each merit is worth 5 achievement points, and merits are awarded for a variety of reasons but are linked to our Guiding Principles of Self Worth, Purpose and Engagement. When students reach the thresholds, they will receive a certificate, letter and a prize. So far 73 students have been awarded our Bronze Certificate with some Silver Certificates on the horizon – well done!

#### Year 9 First Give Social Enterprise Project

In February, Year 9 had their launch of their First Give social enterprise project. The project will be completed in PSHCE lessons over this half term and it provides students with the opportunity to research local charities and be in with the change of winning £1000 to support their chosen charity. Students will work in groups to produce a presentation on their chosen charity. A group will be chosen from each class to take part in the First Give Finals which will be held in the summer term.





#### Year 9 Daniel Spargo-Mabbs (DSM) Foundation

All Year 9 students watched a performance and participated in a workshop called 'I Love You, Mum' as part of their Personal Development Programme. The Daniel Spargo-Mabbs Foundation is a drug and alcohol education charity that aims to support young people to make safe choices about drugs and alcohol and reduce harm. The play tells the true story of Dan, a popular 16 year old boy from South West London, who attended an illegal rave in January 2014, took MDMA (ecstasy) and tragically died as a result of taking a lethal dose. The play tells the story of what happened to Dan, his family and friends, using their own words. Our students were captivated by the story and enjoyed the theatre production.







#### **SORTED Workshops**

As part of our PSHCE programme, Park Academy works closely with local organisation SORTED to support young people in making positive choices by providing them with the knowledge and awareness to help them make informed choices and manage their own well-being. This month, SORTED have been in to present to Year 10 and 11 students to explore drugs misuse, in particular cannabis and the impact that this can have on the body, both short term and over a longer time period.

# **Subject Areas**

#### ATL

This month we welcomed back the Globe Players Theatre Company for our Year 8 students. The group performed an exciting version of Romeo and Juliet to launch their new ATL assignment "Shakespeare Redesigned". This performance is a gateway for many students who have yet to discover the experience of live theatre. In this assignment the students will have the opportunity to create their own live performance of the classic but change it to different points in history such as the Viking era.

Students who are interested in a career within the world of Media or Performing Arts had the opportunity to ask them questions about their journey so far and how they got to be where there now are. It was a fantastic performance and the students were captivated!

#### **STEM Ambassadors**

Many of our students will have the opportunity to work with a STEM ambassador of their choice to receive mentoring with a professional in a career they aspire to be in. It has created an invaluable link between our students and the STEM industries.

Here are a few things our students had had to say about their experiences so far:

#### Orbyts through University College London (UCL)

Some of our most able scientists at Park Academy students have started working with Dr. Pawel Markiewicz, a Researcher from UCL. Dr Markiewicz is an expert in high-throughput medical imaging using PET-MR and PET-CT, including statistical image reconstruction and analysis, data mining and pattern recognition applied to dementia research. The students and Dr Markiewicz got acquainted around some basic anatomy and function of the brain and how PET scanners can be used to create images of the brain. In future sessions they will delve into how PET can be used to assess conditions of Dementia and their value in future clinical trials. We are excited by what our students will discover!







#### **STEM Club Update**

STEM club happens every Tuesday after school in Science. Students get to take part in a range of activities and challenges that they wouldn't normally do! All of the students that attend say that it's lots of fun! All Key Stage 3 students are welcome to come along!

- 1. Madame Jourdain and Señora Palenzuela run two break time clubs: the French Film club and the Spanish Music club. The lunchtime film club remains a big favourite.
- Madame Chetti runs GCSE French clinics every break and lunch time from Monday to Friday, except for Tuesday break 1, to help Year 11 students with their speaking practice in preparation for their mocks and speaking exams.



### **Careers**

#### **Toni & Guy Learning Academy**

As part of National Apprenticeship Week, a group of Year 10 and 11 students visited the Toni & Guy Learning Academy in London. Whilst at the Academy, our students learnt about the apprenticeship pathway that Toni & Guy offer and how to make applications. The group also watched hair demonstrations by International Artist Director, Efi Davies, and Academy Educator, Sanja Mandusic who are part of the Global Artist Team at Toni & Guy. They definitely made styling hair look easy! Following this the group had a workshop under the supervision of Sanja where the group practiced and refined their hair styling practice. The opportunity was inspiring for the students and provided an insight into opportunities that are available to them.









#### **Uxbridge College Taster Sessions**

At the end of Year 11, a large number of our students going onto Uxbridge College to complete a range of vocational courses. As our local college, we have been working hard to build links with them, as part of this we are able to take some Year 9-11 students to the college to participate in some taster sessions. After a tour of the college and a talk about the different courses available the students took part in either a plumbing or hair & beauty workshop. In both sessions, students learnt some of the basic skills required for the courses. The students represented the Academy really well and were engaged throughout the afternoon. Uxbridge College were really complementary about our students and said they were very talented!









#### **Year 10 University Visits**

In order to support our students with making informed choices about their future pathways, all Year 10 students have the opportunities to visit a university. So far, students have visited Brunel University and St Anne's College at Oxford University. There are more visits planned for the summer term!

#### **Brunel University**

Fifty Year 10 students visited Brunel University. They were met by Student Ambassadors and were given an introduction into University in general, but more specifically Brunel University. Students were given a guided tour of the university, including the lecture theatres, Student Union and the World Class Sporting Facilities. After lunch, the group got back together and worked in smaller groups to create their own University Society. There were some very imaginative societies including the Fashion Society where members got to travel around the world to all the different Fashion Weeks, and the Lazy Society where everyone could be lazy together. Everyone thought this was a good idea, until someone pointed out that some people may be too lazy to get together! All the ideas were pitched and presented to the group which was very nerve wracking for some, but they all did really well. The day really provided students with an insight into life at University.







#### At Anne's College, Oxford University

Following a workshop earlier this term, a group of 25 Year 10 students headed to At Anne's College in Oxford. After a long journey in the mini bus, students were welcomed by the Widening Access Team and their Student Ambassadors. It was a packed day, which included a tour of the college, speaking with students and a visit to the Oxford University Museum of National History. Although it was a quick visit, student were able to see their Beluga Whale skeleton that is over 4 metres in length and hold some of the fossils that they have in their collection. It was a really informative day and students and staff had a fantastic time.

#### Peterhouse College, Cambridge Workshops

Selected Year 9 students participated in a workshop run by Peterhouse College of Cambridge University. The aim of the workshop was to introduce the students to Cambridge University as well as explore some of the differences between life at school and life at university. The students were really engaged and helped to solve the mystery of who stole Antoni's biscuits!

Some Year 12 students then took part in a workshop focused on making competitive applications to Oxbridge Universities so that students are fully prepared when they start their applications in Summer Term. Students gained an understanding of the application process for Oxbridge, how this differs from other universities and some of the additional requirements of these universities. The students left the session motivated and inspired to achieve their best grades so that they can get to their tar university.









#### Year 12 AED – Joining Forces with SCS to develop innovative solutions for HS2





For their next assignment in AED, Year 12 students are working with SCS to develop innovative solutions to real life challenges the company are facing. Students have selected either challenges facing the companies is being Diesel free, whilst still working within the financial boundaries and sticking to deadlines, whilst others are focusing on engaging with the community to get their support on the development.

During their presentation from Harrison and Gary who are working on the SCS project at West Ruislip, the Year 12 students gained a deeper understanding of the aim of the entire HS2 Project, Europe's Largest Infrastructure Project and some of the efficiency challenges that the project is facing:

- As a delivery partner SCS has been tasked with raising the standards of infrastructure delivery.
- SCS must also deliver efficiency savings of around 10% of the contract value that's £1 in every £10 spent.
- With resource and material costs increasing, the efficiency challenge is critical in offsetting any additional increase in costs.
- SCS need to align our way of working to ensure we're in the best position to deliver on our promises to HS2 and the UK.

Students are busy researching their thoughts and ideas ahead of a site visit where they will check in with members of the Innovation Team at West Ruislip to talk through their ideas. We really look forward to hearing what they come up with.

#### **Breakfast Club**

Breakfast Club runs every day from 7.30am every day and is open to all students. Students who receive Free School Meals are entitled to a free breakfast of one food item and one drink. All other students are able to purchase a wide range of hot and cold breakfast items. Breakfasts are provided by Cucina, the Academy caterers, in the Canteen.

Eating a healthy breakfast before starting the school day is linked to improved concentration, better test and examination results, increased energy and maintaining a healthier lifestyle. Breakfast is especially important for young students whose brains use about half of the body's energy.

We strongly encourage all students to eat breakfast in the morning, and welcome all students at our Breakfast Club.
